

The **Bell UH-1 Iroquois** (nicknamed "**Huey**") is a utility <u>military helicopter</u> designed and produced by the American aerospace company <u>Bell Helicopter</u>. Development of the Iroquois started in the early 1950s, a major impetus being a requirement issued by the <u>United States Army</u> for a new <u>medical evacuation</u> and <u>utility</u> <u>helicopter</u>. The <u>Bell 204</u>, first flown on 20 October 1956, was warmly received, particularly for the performance of its single <u>turboshaft</u> engine over <u>piston engine</u>-powered counterparts. An initial production contract for 100 *HU-1As* was issued in March 1960. In response to criticisms over the rotorcraft's power, Bell quickly developed multiple models furnished with more powerful engines; in comparison to the prototype's <u>Lycoming YT53-L-1</u> (LTC1B-1) engine, producing 700 <u>shp</u>(520 kW), by 1966, the <u>Lycoming T53-L-13</u>, capable of 1,400 shp (1,000 kW), was being installed on some models

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
